WHAT IS ADVENT?

The word Advent means "coming." It is a time to slow down, be quiet and meditate about the real meaning of Christmas. These four weeks before Christmas are a time to prepare our hearts and our lives as we wait for the coming of Jesus. We focus on the promise that God made to his people and how that promise was fulfilled in Jesus. Advent is also the beginning of the liturgical year. The Advent season begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas and ends on the day before Christmas. It hould be a time for new beginning for us as Christians.

One color stands out among all the others used at this holy season: Blue -- not the usual red or green. In antiquity, purple dye was very expensive, so purple came to signify wealth, power and royalty. Therefore, purple is the color for the season of Advent, which celebrates the coming of the King. Many churches use blue in Advent which signifies hopeful expectation and is traditionally associated with the Virgin Mary. Also, deep blue is the color of the clear, predawn sky, the color that covers the earth in the hours before the sun rises in the east. Most of us are not looking at the sky at that hour – perhaps we're still asleep, or too drowsy to notice. Nonetheless, a deep, dark blue is the color that covers us in the dawning twilight.

Thus we use deep blue for Advent to shade the season with a hint of expectation and anticipation of the dawn of Christ. Surely penitence and spiritual discipline are part of the traditional Advent observance, and this is why so many of us are using Advent wreaths and devotionals to mark the days before Christmas.

Advent involves more than penitence, and by using deep blue we emphasize the church's hope-filled and faithful watch for Christ. The deep blue of Advent inspires the hope of faith, it encourages us to keep watch for the promised light of Christ to break over the horizon, changing night into day, darkness into light, and filling our lives and our world with a holy and righteous splendor.

This booklet is designed to be your daily devotional, either privately or with others. Many members of Christ Church have contributed their thoughts on words we commonly hear during Advent. Each short essay is accompanied by a Scripture verse and a short prayer. Advent is not just a season, but a pathway that leads us to new beginnings. Your journey starts here. Rejoice and be glad in it!

JOURNEY Sunday, December 2

The LORD had said to Abram, "Leave your country, your people and your father's household and go to the land I will show you. I will make you into a great nation and I will bless you. I will make your name great and you will be a blessing."

Genesis 12:1-2

Spring is my favorite time of year because of the intense colors that show up. The "spring green" seems to be more intense in grass and leaf, and blooms emerge in a myriad of colors that are equally bright and deep. Growing up in the Panhandle of Texas, I experienced spring colors that were bright, but not nearly as varied as they are here in Central Texas. The spring colors, especially in the wildflowers are one of the reasons I love living in Central Texas.

The leaves and grass that emerge, along with the colors, are great evidence of simplicity and complexity that are wrapped up in the seeds. Seeds contain compounds that keep them from sprouting until conditions are just right. Stored up with the compounds are enzymes that make nutrients necessary for the energy the baby plant needs, providing the energy to grow. The "sprout" has all the nutrients necessary for life, and in measures that are exorbitantly more than in the plant as it matures. When the soil is rich and moisture readily available, the earth comes alive with what is needed to feed and to simply brighten our lives.

All is dependent on a moment that cannot be easily defined, on a process that can be observed but not easily replicated. Life springs in the world around us, and in us "from the Lord, the Giver of Life". Our world is Changed. We are Changed. And we sing!

Why would the well-prepared vineyard produce "wild" grapes? In the context of the story, "wild" seems to mean "unexpected" and "undesirable." We often make our best preparations to ensure predictable, quality outcomes in our lives. Instead, wild things happen and we get unexpected and undesirable results. Preparation and expectation are not enough – we must be willing to accept that there are factors we can't foresee that may produce wild outcomes. We must be resilient enough and have faith enough to go back to the drawing board and let God work through us.

Messiah's call to the rough is really a call to a relationship with him. And, for that relationship to occur, everything has to be given up. Which really seems rough. That roughness, seen through the eyes of the Father and not through the eyes of the world, is a call to a present and eternal life in the presence of God. Then, what was once perceived as rough is now seen as blessing. As a young boy I remember spending several Saturdays in February helping my grandfather prune his large fig tree. Granddaddy was so careful about which branches he pruned and a project that seemed like it should only take 30 minutes lasted almost a whole day or two! Over many years I began to learn from him how to prune a fig tree and why he was so careful. He told me that you must always pay attention to which branches produce fruit and which do not. He called the ones that did not produce fruit, suckers. These are the branches that take nutrients away from the fruit bearing parts of the tree. His careful attention to which parts of the tree bore fruit always left him with a bounty of figs during the harvest as well as the healthiest fig tree in Glynn County. The time we spent together taught me more than how to prune a fig tree. It taught me that I, too need to do the internal work of pruning parts of my life that are distractions to my God given calling. We all have pruning that we need to do all the time. We know there are things that distract us from what we are called to do for the sake of the Gospel. What are those things that we need to prune today? Expectations are worrisome things. Advent calls us to leave unfinished business right there where we left it -- undone, unwrapped and unbaked – and put our expectations in their proper place. Author Henry David Thoreau decided to leave citified trappings for a pastoral retreat. He wrote, "We must learn to reawaken and keep ourselves awake, not by mechanical aid, but by an infinite expectation of the dawn." "Infinite expectation of the dawn" guides us beyond the artificial hustle-bustle to a newer, fresher life promised by a baby's birth in a stable.

Advent reminds us that we have other more pressing duties: to discover God's call to our real work -- recommitting ourselves to praying, learning, helping, serving and lifting up others. Only then do we understand why the poor are blessed, how the meek inherit the earth and when comfort comes to those who mourn. Only then do we truly understand how 5,000 can be fed from one boy's lunch pail, how a crippled person can walk again and how a man who died three days before can rise up alive, well and hungry.

Advent is not a time to fear or be dismayed. Advent calls us to break away our shackles of the season's busy-ness and to look forward to God's call to holy service.
